CRIS is a social psychology laboratory that focuses on the underlying factors associated with stigma and identity, considering both the experience of those possessing and perceiving stigmatized identities.

- **Honors Thesis:** Investigated perceptions of prejudice from essentialism endorsement and evaluated downstream consequences of essentialism exposure amongst sexual minorities. Planned study design, survey creation, Prolific and MTurk postings, OSF preregistration, data analysis with SPSS, and manuscript write-up
- **Independent Summer Fellowship Research:** Conducted literature review on psychological factors associated with prejudice towards marginalized (or stigmatized) groups. Aided in design of experimental research study and created study materials. Created online survey and learned data analysis using SPSS
- **Research Confederate:** Collected data for an intensive in-lab experimental research study on disclosures of concealable stigmatized identities. Acted as confederate and coded participants verbal and non-verbal responses and affect during study
